Thank you for your help in raising funds for our school.



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

THE SCIENCE FAIR IS COMING

It is very possible that those words may inspire nightmares of last minute meltdowns and Google searches for a good science project—but help is here! Students have already started the process of topic picking and research.

The Science Fair is about far more than Science. Research shows that one of the more profound weaknesses of our current generations (Gen Z and Gen Alpha) is the inability to tackle and successfully complete a large project. They are big dreamers and have great ideas, but then struggle with how to systematically work towards a goal in order to successfully accomplish it. Part of the methodology behind our Science Fair is to help students learn to attack a big task with small bites through smaller projects and established deadlines. We want our students to cultivate the mindset that big things are achieved one small step at a time, making it all more doable and less scary. We need your help in this training. Students will be coming home with information and task deadlines so that you are aware of the milestone dates. Please continue to encourage your student to keep working—one little bite at a time.
